
Star Spangled Mondays

You pull into the short, gravel driveway at 8:25am on a Monday. Not much of the camp can be seen from the road, except for the recreation center, the barn, and a small, fenced-in horse pasture. The gate is open, and several cars are in the parking lot. On the front porch of the building there are already a dozen other kids your age running around, talking, and laughing. Many are wearing yellow t-shirts; some brand new, others crammed with signatures and doodles from previous years. You step out of the car with your lunchbox and walk up to the porch. The camp director and several counselors wave to you. They smile and say "Good morning! What's your name? We have a backpack for you here." They hand you a backpack, with your own new camp T-shirt inside. You can't help but wonder what the activities are for the day, so you ask. They smile and begin

to explain. Before you know it, the camp day is almost over, and you can't wait to see what the rest of the week has in store!

The activities Camp Jabez offers, such as horseback riding, the zip line, and the high ropes course, may be similar to other summer camps; but Camp Jabez is so much more than recreation. The camp's outdoors setting gives kids an excellent opportunity to get away from the screen time they are so regularly immersed in. But

far more importantly, it gives them a chance to learn about God as they see and discover His creative nature and incredible designs. Every camp day also opens with a Bible study, allowing campers to explore God's Word and the love He has for us. Camp Jabez is a place where kids can try new things, make friends, explore God's creation, and learn about God and the salvation found only through Jesus Christ.

One major highlight of the camp is the horse activities. Every week, time in the barn is possibly the most enjoyed time by all of the campers. But it isn't just about riding the horses—they also get to experience grooming the horses, playing games with them, and even participating in barn chores. They learn the responsibility that comes with having horses as they help care for this magnificent part of God's creation.

Outside of the barn, kids also enjoy

the high ropes course, rock wall, and zip line. These three are loads fun, but they also challenge campers physically and mentally as they overcome their fears, learn to trust God, and grow in courage and endurance. There are many other activities that are both fun and challenging in different ways. Some examples include crafts, archery, fishing, a nature walk, paddleboats, the Narrow Way low ropes course, and many, many games. Other activities are more focused on encouraging teamwork, such as The Great Race and the Pilgrim's Progress obstacle course.

These are just some ways campers can benefit from time spent at Camp Jabez. In addition to learning new skills and trying new activities, kids also have the chance to learn more about God, deepen their faith and understanding of Him, and build relationships with the other campers. Camp Jabez really is "a place where fun, faith, and friends are found."
